Chair's Report – James Silcox Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission January 17, 2019

Executive Director Report 2017-2018 Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission (SFSDC)

January 17, 2019

I have worked for SFSDC for over six years. It has been terrific to have the opportunity to be involved with our growers who contribute their levy and our Board of Directors, advisors, researchers, buyers, government personnel and industry partners. Many thanks for their time and efforts given to the Commission.

The SFSDC Board of Directors hosted the grower information session in Saskatoon on January 11, 2018 and held four board meetings during 2017-2018. SFSDC worked with the Northeast Agriculture Research Foundation (NARF) and the Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) Research Farm at Melfort to host the research plot tour and barbecue on July 27, 2017. Over forty participants looked at forage research plots. Our 2018 field tour and barbecue was also held at NARF.

Two editions of the *Prairie Seeds Newsietter* were published during 2017-2018. Past editions are posted on the SFSDC website. The Commission contributes articles and purchases three editions each year of the Manitoba *Forage Seed News* magazine for current levy payers. We also provide partial funding for the market articles that were published in the magazine and linked on our website. SFSDC contributes funds and articles to the Saskatchewan Forage Council's (SFC) monthly email update called eNews. The recently upgraded SFSDC website received 12,600 hits in 2017-2018 and a total of 63,500 since it was launched in July 2011. Saskatchewan Agriculture provided the funding for the upgrade.

The SFSDC Board's main focus is on Research and by using growers' levy, the Board has been able to help leverage over \$750,000 funding in the recent 5 year period. This has been a goal in the past few years to increase the level of forage seed research with funding by the Saskatchewan Agriculture Development Fund (ADF).

Drs. Sean Prager and Bill Biligetu at the University of Saskatchewan (U of S) secured a grant of \$215,300 from ADF and began work on Integrated Management to Optimize Red Clover Seed Production. Master's Degree student Dan Malamura is heading up the project. SFSDC pledged \$7,500 each year for the three year project.

The Weed Management Program (U of S) applied herbicides to established tall fescue, hybrid bromegrass and sainfoin as well as plant growth regulators (PGR) to established sweet clover and hybrid bromegrass in 2018. The Weed Management Program is going in a different direction in 2019 and will no longer be doing tests for SFSDC. We thank Dr. Chris Willenborg, Eric Johnson and their crew for the excellent work done for SFSDC in the past five years.

SFSDC contributed \$2,500 to the Forage Variety Demonstration and Testing Program and helped sponsor and edit the SFC's revision of the Invasive Weeds Guide.

NARF at the Melfort Research Farm was the centre of many of our 2018 projects including:

- Minor use herbicide testing on established red and alsike clovers, as well as slender wheatgrass;
- PGR testing on established slender wheatgrass;
- · Annual ryegrass nitrogen fertility in combination with the application of a PGR;
- Herbicide screening on annual ryegrass;
- Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture provided funding for two ADOPT projects at NARF:
 - Evaluating the Placement of Companion Crops in Forage Seed Production a two-year project
 with meadow bromegrass and wheat to confirm results obtained in the 2014-2015 project; and
 - Demonstrating the Effects of Red and Alsike Clover Seed Crops in Rotations clovers were planted alone or with canola in 2017 to determine canola's effect on clover seed production in 2018.

The final report for the ADOPT project Direct Seeding and Pre-Seeding Cultivation with Red Clover and Faba Bean was posted on the SFSDC website.

SFSDC relies on our industry partners who provided products for our research program. Thank you to DLF Pickseed Canada, BASF Canada, Bayer CropScience, Brett Young, Corteva Agriscience, Engage Agro, FMC Corporation, NuFarm Canada, Quantum Biosciences, and Syngenta Canada for their support of the forage seed industry.

SFSDC continues to work with Alberta and Manitoba forage seed producers to develop minor use priorities in the national Minor Use research program. These priorities are submitted by Saskatchewan Agriculture to obtain national funding for future pesticide registrations.

Forage seed sales from Saskatchewan growers were valued at over \$9.8 Million in the 2017-2018 crop year; up from \$8 Million last year. Much improved harvest conditions in 2017 had a positive impact for growers improving the quantity and quality for the crop. The 2017-2018 forage seed crop summary and the SFSDC levy is shown in the table below. Legumes led the way, with red and alsike clovers the largest crops, and Timothy the largest grass seed crop.

The financial statements of Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. When alternative accounting methods exist, management has chosen those it deems most appropriate in the circumstances. These statements include certain amounts based on management's estimates and judgments. Management has determined such amounts based on a reasonable basis in order to ensure that the financial statements are presented fairly in all material respects.

The integrity and reliability of Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission 's reporting systems are achieved through the use of formal policies and procedures, the careful selection of employees and contractors and an appropriate division of responsibilities. These systems are designed to provide reasonable assurance that the financial information is reliable and accurate.

The Board of Directors is responsible for ensuring that management fulfills its responsibility for financial reporting and is ultimately responsible for reviewing and approving the financial statements. The Board carries out this responsibility by periodically meeting with management and, if necessary, the members' auditors to review significant accounting, reporting and internal control matters. The Board also considers, for review approval by the members, the engagement or re-appointment of the external auditors.

The financial statements have been audited on behalf of the members by NeuPath Group Chartered Professional Accountants, in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission, which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2018 and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

PURPOSE OF THE COMMISSION

Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission (SFSDC) operates to promote and enhance the forage seed industry in Saskatchewan for a maximum return to producers through research, leadership and communication in the industry.

The SFSDC is a non-profit organization incorporated under the Agri-Food Act, 2004 of Saskatchewan and as such, is not subject to income taxes.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNFPO) using the following significant accounting policies:

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash in chequing and savings accounts. The carrying amounts approximate fair value.

Capital assets

Capital assets are expensed in the year they are acquired.

Financial instruments policy

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Revenue recognition

Saskatchewan Forage Seed Development Commission follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Levies are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

4. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Commission is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the Commission's risk exposure and concentration as of June 30, 2018.

(a) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Commission is exposed to credit risk from forage seed marketers. Approximately 88% of levies are received from two marketers of forage seed. The Commission manages its credit risk by monitoring the activities of marketers and by educating marketers of their legislative requirement to collect and forward levies to the Commission.

The Commission manages its credit risk surrounding cash by dealing with reputable financial institutions. The Commission invests surplus funds to earn investment income with the objective of maintaining safety of the principal and providing adequate liquidity to meet the cash flow requirements.

(b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Commission manages its liability risk by monitoring actual and forecasted cash flows from operations and anticipated investing and financing activities.

At June 30, 2018 the Commission has a cash balance of \$35,838 (2017 - \$44,623).

(c) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency rate risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The Commission is mainly exposed to interest rate risk on its term deposits and other price risk associated with forage seed prices.

5. BUDGETED FIGURES

The budgeted figures, approved by the Board on July 27, 2017, are presented for comparative purposes only and have not been audited or reviewed.
